Dear Readers,

Towards the end of *The Crucifixion*, John Stainer's musical meditation on the passion of Christ, which Trinity Festival Choir will be presenting on the evening of Palm Sunday, the chorus makes a moving appeal, singing as if they were the Crucified. The appeal is *Is it nothing to you, all you that pass by?* words from the Old Testament book of Lamentations. Similar words occur at a critical turning point in George Herbert's sixty-three verse poem *The Sacrifice*:

O all ye who pass by, behold and see Man stole the fruit, but I must climb the tree; The tree of life to all, but only me: Was ever grief like mine?

The second 'but', in the third line means 'except', so the idea of the line is that the cross on which Jesus died was the tree of life for everyone but himself. In the previous line, the poet uses typology which will be familiar to you from Paul's New Testament letters, where Adam is seen as the primal man and Jesus the ultimate man. Yet the poet makes the line sound quite homely by using the imagery of fruit-stealing and tree-climbing. The notion that Christ hanging on the tree of the cross recalls and reverses the tree of life in Adam's paradise is powerful.

A later stanza evokes the agony of Christ by stopping a line before it has finished:

But O my God, my God! why leavest thou me, The son, in whom thou dost delight to be?

My God, my God -----

Was ever grief like mine?

You may notice that these two stanzas end with the same question from Jesus's lips. In fact, each verse of the poem ends with that last line, right up to the last verse, when there is a dramatic shift so it ends, *Never was grief like mine*.

Why do I love this poem so much? Because, although its title suggests otherwise, it is a simple exposition of the most straightforward of atonement theories, which, simply put, declares that in dying Christ appeals to our better natures in such a way that we make a positive change. That's not only to do with Good Friday. Everything about Jesus – his birth, his life, his teaching, his suffering, his death and his resurrection – inspires that change in us.

Everyone is invited to this meeting, led by Revd Graham Woolgar - even if you have not been part of a group over the last weeks.


In Memoriam Helen Munroe

The service will explore suffering, lament and a new hope, echoing themes that Dr Martin Luther King gave in a speech to the Berlin Jazz Festival, shortly after his visit to Methodist Central Hall, Westminster in 1964. In his speech about Jazz, Dr Martin Luther King, said,

Jazz speaks for life. The Blues tell the story of life's difficulties, and if you think for a moment, you will realise that they take the hardest realities of life and put them into music, only to come out with some new hope or sense of triumph. Jazz is triumphant music... Everybody has the Blues. Everybody longs for meaning. Everybody needs to love and be loved. Everybody needs to clap hands and be happy. Everybody longs for faith. In music, especially this broad category called Jazz, there is a stepping stone towards all of these.

The 'Jazz Vespers' service has been put together by saxophonist Dan Forshaw, who leads the Jazz Vespers Ministry at Methodist Central Hall Westminster. Dan has also led jazz services at St. Paul's Cathedral and Ely Cathedral and is part of the 'Blue Church' network of Christian Jazz Musicians from all over the world.
