Will Christmas ever end? by Dave Dickinson

Christmas 2017, the anniversary year of the 1917 Russian Revolution and the 1517 Protestant Reformation, reminds me that both Communists and Reformers have at different times tried to repress the celebration of Christmas. Hogmanay is big in Scotland because seventeenth-century Calvinists did not want people to party on a religious festival and Stalin, in his attempt to crush Christianity in the Soviet Union, transferred winter festivities (so necessary at such a dark time of year) from Christmas to New Year.

Some have said that Christmas is under threat yet again. The increasing tendency in America to wish people "Happy Holidays" rather than "Merry Christmas" is cited as an instance of anti-Christmas sentiment. Yet it seems to me that Christmas gets bigger year on year. Churches and cathedrals will be brimming at midnight on Christmas Eve. About 90% of British atheists and agnostics will observe the festival without any qualms. So will about three quarters of Hindus and Buddhists living in Britain. Christmas shows little sign of decline in a society currently seeing decline in many other expressions of Christianity.

Christmas won't go away because, for most people, it is a valuable secular celebration injecting goodwill and magic into a cold, barren and dark time of year. Our missionary challenge as a contemporary church is to engage with this perception of the festival and take it further. How do we cut through the schmaltz and carve a way through the commercialism so that people see God at the heart of it all? How do we transform goodwill into Godliness? How can we help people see truth veiled in what many experience as an incredible story? One first step each of us might take is to "join the celebration" (to use the words of a bouncy carol) – in our Carol Services, on Christmas Eve and on Christmas Day.

Will Christmas ever end? Of course not, it goes with us into 2018 and beyond. Christmas is not just for Christmas.
