Dear friends

In this season after Pentecost I have been thinking about various symbols of the Spirit and what they might have to teach us: Fire, Wind, Dove, and so on.

Celtic monks centuries ago had a symbol all their own: they thought of the Spirit as a 'Wild Goose.' They often chose their places of prayer in the remotest places in nature. They wanted to pray, and at the same time hear the roaring of the waves. And so it was quite natural for them to think of the Spirit as wild and untamed, unpredictable and even dangerous: not at all like the more familiar symbol of the peaceful and graceful dove.

When the Spirit comes in the Bible, it never seems to be sweet or safe. God's Spirit called the prophets in words that were bold and sometimes dangerous. Ezekiel saw a vision of God's Spirit blowing through a valley of dry bones and bringing them to life. John the Baptist dressed in camel's hair and eating wild locusts proclaimed, 'I baptize you with water but he who comes after me will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and with fire.'

It was this Wild Goose that Jesus referred to when he quoted Isaiah, saying, 'For the Spirit of the Lord is upon me for he has anointed me to preach good news to the poor, to proclaim release to the captives, and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who are oppressed, to proclaim the year of God's favour.'

Wild geese fly in flocks, feed in groups, nest near each other and migrate together - naturalists call this trait their 'colonial' nature. Isn't that just like the Holy Spirit? The Spirit brings us together and makes a noisy community of us. The Wild Goose brings us together in God's special fellowship. We see the same principle at work in the famous "V" formation of their flying. First one takes the brunt of the wind and leads the flock. When it tires, it drops back and the next goose in line takes the front position.

At Pentecost, the Wild Goose led Peter to proclaim, 'I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams.' In the Church, the Spirit calls everyone to lead and everyone to serve. Women become preachers, men learn to serve tables, and a little child shall lead them.

I wonder if we have so tamed the Holy Spirit that we cannot hear the call of the Wild Goose. Have we failed to listen for so long that we feel nothing? The Wild Goose is still calling. Can you hear it? I pray that in all our words and ways we will hear the calling and rise up with wings to follow where the Wild Goose leads.

St Nicholas Supper Club Talk


An evening with Brian Murphy and Linda Regan

A Jug of Oil for Sutton by Dave Dickinson



When Elijah was in hiding east of the Jordan, ravens fed him and, when he moved on to another region, God told him a widow would feed him. The widow, however, had nothing prepared, only a handful of meal in a jar and a little oil in a cruse. Nevertheless, she used these to bake a cake for Elijah. From then on neither the jar nor the cruse was ever emptied. This story has been on my mind for over a year while I have been chairing a small group from Trinity working towards establishing a bereavement support network for the people of Sutton, for the story of the widow's ever-yielding cruse of oil supplied the name of the nation's best-known bereavement support group — Cruse.

Our ambition is to launch **Sutton Cruse Bereavement Support** in early 2018. Part of the national network, we will be an independent Area, a community-based service available to people throughout Sutton. Although, if successfully launched, Sutton Cruse will have been seeded by Trinity people, it will serve people of all faiths and none. Our plan is to employ a part-time administrator who will be responsible for recruiting and training volunteers. He or she will have an office base where volunteers can meet clients who may have been referred by GPs, funeral officiants or others. A befriending form of support, tailored for each individual client, will be provided and, if specialist counselling is required, Sutton Cruse will have a gateway of referral to Sutton Counselling. Sutton Cruse will not offer counselling.

Although there is still much to do before we can be confident of launching next year, we would not have got this far without the encouragement and efforts of Briony Thomas, Margaret Reith and Angela Mann who have thought this through very carefully for nearly 18 months, as well as the new enthusiasm of Michael Blackburn who will serve as treasurer and of Diana Burkitt from Sutton Counselling. These comprise the Management Team, whose efforts in the remainder of 2017 will be focussed on raising funds, appointing an administrator, recruiting volunteers and setting up. Still a bit to do! But I am hoping for support from many Sutton churches and I am convinced that, in the long run, Sutton Cruse will help lift the burden of grief weighing down so many people in Sutton.

Johann Strauss Morgenblätter (Morning Papers) by Jeff Richards, Licensed Lay Minister, Sutton Team Ministry

Morgenblätter is a Viennese Walz composed by Johann Strauss in 1863 and the inspiration for a poem by Jacqueline Dunn, a member of St Barnabas Church written in response to an announcement of a poetry competition run in parallel to this year's BBC Proms season. Jacqueline lives with mental health issues and uses writing as a release and has given me permission to share her poem. She has powerful memories of learning to play Morgenblätter as a child.

The Ghost of Strauss

- Morning papers how are you today?
 Visions as we speak, it's not so unique Gratitude for your work.
 Inspiration for your soul which is bound to be whole
- 3. I played Morgenblätter as a child Releasing tension as we abide. You remain in history as a solemn man. Yet you produced a peace of art forever with your art.
- One's talent is within as you begin.
 Note by note you gain a peace.
 A peace with your mind as you drain away
 All your sorrow into creation and development of tomorrow.
- 4. You're alive today in many ways
 And brought music to the life of mankind.
 From Punk to Rock you shall ever roll
 In the thesis of control

The act of writing, itself a creative act, allows Jacqueline to structure her thoughts, prioritise her feelings, at the same time reliving the strong sense of peace that the music conjured up within her. There is ambiguity in stanza 2; it is not clear whether she is addressing Strauss, contemplating herself or prompting us to wonder. Simple words can have deeper meanings than we first think.

DEVOTIONS

Dietrich Bonhoeffer (1906-1945) was a German Lutheran pastor, theologian, and a participant in the German resistance movement against the Nazis. He was arrested in April 1943 by the Gestapo and executed by hanging in April 1945, 23 days before the Nazis' surrender. Bonhoeffer wrote the prayer below while held in a Nazi prison, uncertain of what his future would hold.

Mike Dales offers us this prayer for uncertain times.

Bonhoeffer's Morning Prayer

O God, early in the morning I cry to you. Help me to pray and to concentrate my thoughts on you: I cannot do this alone.

In me there is darkness, but with you there is light; I am lonely, but you do not leave me; I am feeble in heart, but with you there is help; I am restless, but with you there is peace; In me there is bitterness, but with you there is patience.

Ido not understand your ways but you know the way for me

Lord, whatever this day may bring, your name be praised.
