Dear Reader,

I picked up a book in an independent bookshop a few weeks ago which I thought would suit me perfectly. Its title was its initial attraction: Hope without Optimism. That its author was one of my favourite critics, Terry Eagleton, sealed the deal. Its first line convinced me I had chosen well: Eagleton claimed to be writing "as one for whom the proverbial glass is not only half empty but almost certain to contain some foultasting, potentially lethal liquid." I felt sure reading this book would help me to preach on the most neglected of the three theological virtues, hope. The question it discusses is 'How do we keep hope alive when all around us is falling apart?'

Plenty Coups was the last great chief of the American Crow tribe. In the 1890s, the Crow lost nearly two-thirds of their number because of disease, war with their rival Sioux and Blackfeet and the devastation of buffalo herds. before the survivors were herded onto a reservation. Plenty Coups knew that his people's way of life was on the brink of catastrophic collapse, but he dreamt a divine request that he accept the ruin of his tribe's way of life in the trust that that was the only way his people could struggle through to a good end. One thinks of Job saying to Yahweh, "Even if you kill me, I will have hope in you," and of the lines in John Wesley's hymn, "Though waves and storms go o'er my head, though strength, and health, and friends be gone, though joys be withered all and dead ... on this my steadfast soul relies - Father, thy mercy never dies." St Paul calls this hoping against hope.

Plenty Coups was a baptised Christian, who saw that his commitment to God was sufficient to sustain trust in a future for his people. What Plenty Coups showed, when his people were in free fall, is the nature of authentic hope, which can be whatever salvaged, guarantees, from the general dissolution that surrounds us. There is always something residual which will not give way but which will blossom into new life. The glories of life are laid dead in the dust, "and from the ground there blossoms red life that shall endless be."
