Dear Readers,

By the time you read this, Christian Aid Week in the middle of May will be but a distant memory. The activists who collected street to street will be resting their weary feet, grateful for the blessing of good weather as they knocked door-to-door. volunteers who baked cakes for coffee mornings and made music for MusicAid will be looking back on enjoyable moments and the satisfaction of money Donors will feel content both that their money will be put to good use and that the government will be made to hand back tax revenue as Gift Aid.

As usual, there was a particular focus for Christian Aid Week 2019 - being a Mum in Sierra Leone. I am told that Sierra Leone is the most dangerous place in the world to become a mother. In other words, it has the highest childbirth mortality rate. On average, ten Sierra Leonean women die each day in childbirth.

Jebbeh lives in one of Sierra Leone's remote villages. When she went into labour a few years ago, she had to walk three hours under the baking sun to the nearest hospital. With every step, she feared for her life and that of her baby. When she could walk no further, she gave birth to her son by the roadside. She was lucky. Both survived and are doing well. But, her sister, in the same circumstances, died by the same roadside.

Christian Aid Week has passed, but the need has not. Christian Aid, like many aid and relief organisations, values the surge of income that comes their way through special appeals. have dreams of a more equitable world. They have murderous aims: to kill poverty! It's a big target. In fulfilment of their dreams and to achieve their aims, of even greater value to them than the upsurge of special appeals is regular income. All I am saying in this month's pastoral letter is that supporting Christian Aid can mean, for people in our three churches, much more than observing one hectic week.





Eighth Grade (15) written and directed by **Bo Burnham** (2018) a review by Frances Arnold

My friend had been intending to accompany his 18-year-old daughter to this film but, when their plans fell through, he was sufficiently interested by what he'd heard to suggest that I might go with him instead. I had assumed that this was a film for teenagers, but I was encouraged to go when I learned that it was about how the internet shapes the lives of post millennials and heard that it was one of Barack Obama's favourite films. The attendant who checked my ticket at the Odeon told me that I would be crying all the way through (this turned out to be only partly true).

The film portrays the isolation of early adolescence as experienced by Kayla, a socially anxious 13-year-old approaching the end of middle school in New York State. She has a second life online where, ironically, she posts self-help videos on *Being Yourself* and *Putting Yourself Out There*. These are the very things with which she herself struggles in real life and she seems to be using her channel to talk to herself.



Kayla's engaging and caring nature is in stark contrast with the dark loneliness of the environment she has to navigate: being voted 'most quiet' in class, her struggles to connect with her fellow pupils and the terror of attending a party with her classmates. She participates in training for how to respond to a school shooting and there is a predatory scene with an older boy. There is real humour too, particularly in the school scenes, but we were reaching for the tissues because of the acute empathy which triggers something in all of us, irrespective of age, gender or nationality.

Unusually for a coming-of-age movie, there is a faith dimension here. Kayla openly acknowledges her belief in God. The night before an important event, Kayla prays for a good day. Until then, when Kayla is speaking alone in her bedroom, she is projecting herself as a confident and wise person on her YouTube page that nobody watches. At this point, she opens her heart and God is listening. It is a turning point in the film.



Sutton Cruse Bereavement Care a progress report from Briony Thomas and Margaret Reith

Many of you will remember that on September 25th, 2018, Sutton Cruse Bereavement Care was launched - a new bereavement service for Sutton.

Cruse offers free services which are open to anyone living in the London Borough of Sutton and clients hear about Sutton Cruse in many ways. We have a paid coordinator for 16 hours a week, working in our free office space generously donated by GCC a facilities company.

In January we started to see clients. People usually telephone and are offered a place at an Information Session when people learn more about Sutton Cruse and some of the aspects of grief. They have access to our leaflets, and they can sign up for individual bereavement support.

We link our volunteers to clients whom they will usually see weekly for about six sessions. Since January over 50 clients have received individual support with more than 70 receiving information and advice. By the end of June, we will have 19 trained volunteers who will be able to offer support to the clients on our waiting list and help us promote the service. However we are very short of trained supervisors, a situation we are trying hard to rectify. With the numbers of clients we anticipate, we are now recruiting volunteers for our next training starting in September.

We have funding for about a year so great effort will now be channelled into fundraising for the future.

Thank you to our Muslim Friends!

On two recent occasions members of different Muslim communities presented flowers at St Nicholas Church in response to attacks on Christians in Sri Lanka. At *Sutton Soup* on 25 April Sutton's Turkish Muslim community offered them as a token of peace and love and were thanked by the Mayor on behalf of the people of Sutton, and by Jeff Richards on behalf of the congregation. At Evening Prayer on Sunday 5 May the Ahmadiyyah Muslim community of South Cheam offered condolences and solidarity and were thanked by the Revd Frances Arnold. Trinity also received a gift of flowers following a morning service.
