Dear friends

In a recent sermon at St Barnabas Church Jeff Richards reminded us how easy it is for us to rely on ourselves rather than on God; to believe that things, even our salvation, depend on our actions and our efforts rather than on God's grace and how much our world reinforces that idea. Our happiness depends on the next thing: the next trend; the latest phone; the trendiest hairstyle; having seen the newest film. Although the media tells us that it's mostly a risk amongst the younger members of our society, there is, I think for all of us, a real Fear of Missing Out or FOMO as it's often abbreviated to.

That is, perhaps, where the gift of Lent comes in.

Lent is a season which encourages us not to rush, but to slow down or even stay still. We are encouraged not to do more, but to give something up. The church urges us to enter into our own wilderness experience and to do just that – experience it – rather than trying to tame it and make it comply with our expectations and desires.

The season of Lent has the potential to be a holy holiday. A chance to shed the things that trap us and hold us back and to live in the moment. To shed the 'stuff' of our lives, the hamster wheel of trying to rely on ourselves and learning to trust in God; to believe that God's grace is enough, indeed more than enough, for our needs and to relax into God's love.

I hope that this Lent, we will be able to let go and let God. And that this season will be peaceful, happy and holy for us all.

Where do sermons come from?

Twice within a matter of days, I was asked by different people how long it took to write a sermon. On both occasions I was wrong-footed because no simple answer leapt to mind. I might have truthfully said, "A lifetime." Or, on the basis of an average typing speed of about 40 words a minute, "Just over half an hour." But neither is a particularly helpful answer.

The gestation of what emerges on any given Sunday morning is long, so I am often working on several sermons at once. For me the first step is to read the Bible lessons appointed for the day and study them carefully. This involves reading and thinking around the ideas within the texts while making rough notes of random thoughts. That might take a couple of hours, but then comes an immeasurable period when I put these notes aside for a few days and, without specifically thinking about them, let them germinate. Other related ideas will occur and I will note these too. Somewhere in these first two steps the sermon achieves a clear aim.



Stage 3, when I write out a plan, establishes the shape or the structure of the sermon. Sometimes this involves more reading and thinking because I will have recognised the inadequacy or the misdirection of what I was previously planning. Then two or three days before the event, I will write a first draft. I put this aside for at least 24 hours. If things have gone well, the second draft results from a light rewrite of the sentences' phrasing, but sometimes there is still much work to do, often changing the entire introduction or conclusion or rejigging the main body. Stage 5 is to go through it again first thing on Sunday morning still revising, more often deleting than adding, and the final stage is to deliver it. That, at the point of performance, is when it becomes a sermon. What's on the page is merely sheet music.

That's how it is for me. And if you are wondering where the Holy Spirit is in all of this, if I got it right, God is in all of it.

Spotlight (2015)

a film review by Mike Dales



The Boston Globe has won many Pulitzer Prizes in its long history. In 2003 it won one of the prizes for a year-long investigation into the abuse of children by the city's Roman Catholic priests. The abuse had been going on for years and had been covered up again and again because no one had been prepared to confront it. The Globe's investigative reporting team were known as the 'Spotlight' team: hence the name of the film.

The true story is not an easy thing to watch. The subject matter is serious: child abuse in the Boston diocese of the Catholic Church, and institutional efforts to cover up the crimes. And yet, there is something uplifting about the story of good journalists refusing to be cowed by power in order to expose a monstrous evil. The Independent reviewer

pointed out that this is the kind of film that a Henry Fonda or a James Stewart would have starred in once upon a time.

The film has been compared to 'All the President's Men', the film which described the journalism that cracked the Watergate story. And, like that story, the child abuse investigation started as a small local case which ballooned into a major expose of a whole corrupt system. The film follows the investigative reporters and recreates their painstaking work with great attention to detail: they knock on doors, gather information, pester sources, and take notes, but only toward the very end of the film does the scale and impact of it all fully hit them.

Spotlight is not about fiery performances - it's simply a tight and captivating look at journalists who excel at their jobs, and who care about making a difference. It's a riveting and tense film, and you see not only the power of the printed word, but also an inkling of why good newspapers are still necessary.

Spotlight won the Oscar for best film and comes highly recommended. It can be found in the usual sources and in supermarkets where you may find it reduced to £5 or so.
