Dear Readers,

Although this is the first time I am writing for Unite! ecumenism has been a part, both of my training and of my curacy. I trained in the Theological Federation at Cambridge, sharing classes with different denominations, and was a founder member of Biggleswade Churches Together. It has been good to accompany you through Holy Week, walking the way of the cross with Christians from the Sutton Team and Trinity and Sutton Baptist Church. Joint witness in Holy Week, remembering the last days of Jesus' earth together, life on brought opportunities to form and deepen relationships.

After the first Easter Day, the disciples were in a new relationship with Jesus, *in* Christ rather than *with* Christ. This new relationship was settled forty days after the first appearance of the risen Christ, when he ascended into heaven. But he did not leave them or us bereft. He is now permanently with us through his Spirit. It was while he was promising this that, as St Luke says in Acts, 'he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight.'

The point of the story, however, is not so much movement in space as the assumption of authority, 'sitting at the right hand of God.' In this way the Ascension, which we will celebrate on 30 May, gives us a heavenly perspective in which to set the ordering of our life on earth. In his letter to the Ephesians, St Paul relates that at the Ascension Jesus 'gave gifts to his people.' He makes little of the Ascension itself, but majors on the giving of gifts. The gifts are not what we might expect - the gifts of the Spirit which are poured out on individuals. These gifts are ministries and offices, personal it is true, but also corporate, so that the church might be built up in faith and hope and love.

Jesus has equipped the church with what it needs to engage in its tasks. Let us respond in our day, like the first disciples in theirs, with obedience and joy.


Easter Morning at Trinity

Of Men and Angels Michael Arditti (Arcadia Books: 2018)

If you would like to spend time contemplating the Sodom and Gomorrah narrative in the Bible, Michael Arditti's latest novel, *Of Men and Angels*, is the perfect partner. Arditti is possibly the most theologically literate of all contemporary novelists, so his journey across centuries of interpretations of the narrative is an assured one.

The novel is in five sections, each introduced by Archangel Gabriel who travels through the ages. Each of the five eras visited was a time when the science of hermeneutics (that is, biblical interpretation) reached a new stage in its evolution.

The first section is set during the Babylonian exile when the Hebrew scriptures were formed, and Jared, a pious boy educated in the court of King Nebuchadnezzar, is among the scribes working on the texts. When he challenges the orthodox interpretation of the Sodom story, he is taken off the project. The middle ages provide the context for the novel's second

section, which tells of the guilds preparing mystery plays for performance on the streets of York. The Guild of Salters is responsible for the scene which tells the story of Lot and his wife. Dramatic interpretation of the texts causes concern and debate about what taking religious stories out of churches onto the streets does to the texts. The third section is in Renaissance Florence and portrays the struggles the artist, Sandro Botticelli, had when trying to depict Sodom in a manner which would be found acceptable in Savonarola's reactionary city. The middle years of the nineteenth century are the setting for the fourth section. Here Arditti tells of a 'biblical archaeologist' who sets out to establish the historicity of biblical narratives. He searches for the ruins of Sodom. The final section is based in 1980s Hollywood, where a closeted gay actor, now dying of AIDS, makes one last film and stars in a controversial reimagining of Sodom.

Overall, *Of Men and Angels* encourages us to read our Bibles more closely and more carefully. And with more compassion! Then we hear the word of God.
