#### Dear friends

This month the Church will be remembering the 500th anniversary of the beginning of the Reformation. According to the story, on the 31st of October, 1517, an Augustinian monk called Martin Luther nailed some demands onto the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg. This action set of a chain of events which changed the history, not just of the Church, but of Europe and the World. It truly is a momentous thing to remember – something we shall be doing at our united morning service on October 8th.

However, it is also true that the Church is always in a state of reformation and change. Think of the revolutions in music, in thinking about social issues, in finding our place in society, which have all taken place even within our own lifetimes. In fact, if you were to ask me what the Church might look like in twenty years, and how it might think, I would be hard pressed to answer! As for me, I have not retired yet! Advent and Christmas lie ahead and there will, I am sure, be many opportunities to meet with you in worship and in service.

# In the Orchard, the Swallows: Peter Hobbs (Faber and Faber: 2012) A book recommendation by Dave Dickinson

In *Yet Alive?* I discussed Peter Hobbs's debut novel. By chance last week, I fell upon a later novel of his which had escaped my notice. It was for sale at 40% off recommended retail price in an independent book shop and I couldn't resist snapping it up. How glad I was that I did, for it proved to be an enjoyable short read. So much so that, one recent weekend, I reread it on two consecutive days.

Set in Pakistan, this short novel purports to be an extended letter written in later life as a gift to a childhood sweetheart. Her father had objected so strongly to their innocent love that the narrator suffers atrociously. Their tryst in his father's orchard was followed by the boy's summary imprisonment and appalling treatment at the hands of his inhuman torturers. Left with mental and physical scars, he writes of his enduring love for Saba whose circumstances he no longer knows. She may be happily married to someone else or waiting still, as he waits. Either way, he believes she will still remember the orchard and that the memory will ache within her so much that she will long to soothe it, and she will seek him out.

As I read, I remembered solemn lines from John Webster's *The Duchess of Malfi*: "Didst thou ever see a lark in a cage? Such is the soul in the body: this world is like her little turf of grass, and the heaven o'er our heads like her looking-glass, only gives us a miserable knowledge of the small compass of our prison." The novel's narrator,



us a miserable knowledge of the small compass of our prison." The novel's narrator, though, reminds us that not all enclosed spaces are prisons. Indeed, the word 'paradise' derives from a Persian word meaning 'walled garden.' Moreover, he is encouraged when he discovers that swallows nest in the prison yard and that they are free to fly far and high.

In the Orchard, the Swallows speaks to me of love, hope, beauty and innocence trapped in our scarred, ageing and imperfect bodies, like the butterfly trapped in the caterpillar and pupa. But it also speaks to me of the capacity of human beings to break free and soar like eagles (to use Isaiah's image) or like swallows (to use Hobbs's).

#### **News of the Community Sponsorship Scheme**

In July 2016 the government launched the Community Sponsorship Scheme to enable community groups including charities, faith groups, churches and businesses to take on the role of supporting the re-settlement of refugees in the UK. A sponsoring group would be responsible for resettling one refugee family chosen by the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees. The Salvation Army in Merton has already resettled a family.

Sponsors commit to provide housing for the refugee family, as well as helping them to integrate into life in the UK, and access medical and social services. The group will arrange English language tuition and support them towards employment and self-sufficiency. Each group needs to raise at least £9000 to ensure financial stability and must have the approval of the Local Authority.

The **Sutton Roman Catholic Deanery** which consists of eight local parishes has formed a sponsoring group, supported by the Archdiocese of Southwark and **Refugee and Migrant Network Sutton** has pledged its support for the project and will help to draw up the resettlement plan. Sutton College has, in principle, agreed to provide language support. This project needs support — money and household goods and volunteers with relevant skills in interpreting, befriending and administration.
